

Pastor's Page



The late Eugene H. Peterson is perhaps best known for his paraphrase of the Bible titled 'The Message'. While 'The Message' has provided me with some thought provoking and soul stirring reflections over the years lately I've been reading and reflecting on letters written by Eugene to his son Eric, also a Presbyterian pastor. These letters center around the life of the pastor, a vocation Eugene and Eric share (and one also shared by Drew, Eric's son and Eugene's

grandson). One letter struck me in particular as Eugene reflected on the formation of his life and the integration of the various parts of life into a whole.

In his reflection Eugene reminded me of the long term, even life long, nature of formation, both formation as a Christian and as a human person. It's easy to forget (at least it can be for me) that we are continually being formed as people and as disciples of Jesus. There is no graduation date or ceremony of completion in this thing we call life, at least not on this side of eternity.

Our life, and with it our sanctification, regularly offers opportunities (new and familiar) to be whole and holy people. Each time, each moment shaping who we are and how we live. Our task then is to regularly recognize and accept the invitation to continued self formation. How is the Holy Spirit working in our life in this moment to shape us ever more into the image of Christ?

This is a question we can never stop asking ourselves as we continue this life of discipleship. No part of life is too small or inconsequential to be used by God in our formation and sanctification. An interaction with the checkout clerk at the store, the chopping of vegetables as we make dinner, or the way we greet a loved one as they come through the door. Each of these situations is an opportunity for God to shape us into more whole and holy people.

May we all be mindful of the ways the Spirit is using right here and right now to shape us and may we accept the life long invitation to be formed by God into the image of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

"As disciples of a loving God who inspires us to do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with our God, we commit to faithful action to end hunger and address its root causes."

-Hunger Action Congregation covenant. BPC is a Covenant Church in this area.

Ending Hunger and Its Causes — Six Areas:

Hunger Alleviation: providing and/or sharing food in a dignified way with an eye to long-term structural solutions

Development Assistance: addressing the root causes of hunger and poverty through equitable and sustainable development

Hunger Education: learning about systemic causes of hunger, leading towards faithful action that is informed and guided by directly affected people and partner groups

Lifestyle Integrity: adopting sustainable personal and corporate lifestyles to restore justice and protect all of God's creation

Corporate and Public Policy Witness: advocating and campaigning for changes in policies and practices to end hunger and its causes, promote self-development, and care for creation

Worship: incorporating prayer, education, and preaching about ending hunger and its causes into worship

Session Summary

Highlights of the January 17 Stated Meeting and January 29 Annual Congregational Meeting

Congregation will review Accessibility Audit on February 12


A task force has completed an accessibility audit for Buffalo Presbyterian Church and will begin to review its findings with the congregation. The audit was introduced briefly at the Annual Congregational Meeting. Members and friends will be able to take a closer look at the audit on Sunday, February 12, during CCC time after worship. In addition to recommendations for the building and facility, the audit will include ways that our culture, policies, training, and education can be more inviting. Some of the ideas are "quick fixes" while others will require longer term solutions. If you'd like to see the audit, contact Pastor Brian or Christy.

Church's active membership drops to 94

With the deaths of members Rainer Pensky and Sharon Bishop in 2022 the active member roll stands at 94. No one joined our church in 2022. The average Sunday worship attendance last year was 40. The highest attended Sunday was Easter with 86. The second best-attended was the Fall Choir Cantata worship with 68. The Christmas Eve service had 54 attendees. You can look for more interesting facts and information about our accomplishments in the 2022 Annual Report.

Bylaws changes approved

At the Annual Congregational Meeting on January 29 members approved long-overdue changes in the bylaws. Session membership will be reduced from nine to eight Elders. The nominating committee will shrink from seven to five people. The quorum for a congregational meeting will be 20 instead of 25. These changes were recommended by Session due to smaller membership numbers. A new section was added to the bylaws allowing for members to attend meetings remotely via Zoom or similar technologies.
